THE HEART OF THE MATTER

HEARTS were racing across the nation in last year's AFL Grand Final, but it was all too much for one Bulldogs fan who suffered a cardiac arrest just before the final siren.

Rob McCarthy, 65, joked with the woman next to him that his heart would stop if his Dogs managed a win.

But it was no laughing matter when he suddenly slumped over. Off-duty paramedic Liam Moore performed CPR before a defibrillator arrived — an act that saved his life.

Once in hospital, he had a stent inserted in his heart by cardiologist Dr Nick Cox.

Yesterday, they reunited to launch the Heart Foundation's Big Heart Appeal.

The appeal aims to educate people about cardiac arrest, which kills more than 10,000 Australians each year.

Mr McCarthy said he hoped more people would learn CPR to reduce deaths.
